# From Our President

Each month I have been focusing on various committees to bring awareness to the congregation of not only all of the activities we do at HTLC but in hopes that you will find a committee that you would like to be a part of.

This month I am pleased to write about the Worship and Music Committee and our amazing Organist/ Choirmaster Terry Sisk which falls under the Worship and Music Committee. Terry not only plays the beautiful music every Sunday, he also leads the Adult Choir and the Bell Choir.

The Worship and Music Committee consist of the following roles within the church: Assisting Minister, Lector, Usher, Altar Care, Instrumentalist, Adult Choir, Handbell Choir, Youth Singers (grades 6 to 12), Joyful Noise Singers (elementary-age children), Tellers (count offering after worship). Randy Van Epps and Gretchen Luebbe are the liaisons for this ministry. Please contact one of them if you are interested in being a part of any of these activities.

If you have never had the opportunity to have a discussion with Terry regarding his life, let me tell you that you are missing out. I wanted to share with the congregation Terry's amazing knowledge and lifelong accomplishments as well as to share that it will be our wonderful Pipe Organ's (that was donated to us) 15th birthday.

## 15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Our Pipe Organ

The weeks between October 17, 2008, and December 7 of that same year were abuzz with activity related to the delivery, installation and dedication recital of HTLC's "miracle" pipe organ. It is a "miracle" in that the instrument was donated to our church by Arthur Allen Douglas Jr., (1930-2013), a master pipe organ technician based in Virginia's Shenandoah Valley. Upon his retirement, he wanted to build and donate a pipe organ in gratitude to God for his life's work.

An Anglican church near Harrisonburg was the intended recipient of his generosity, but it was discovered that the building could not support the weight of the instrument, and the congregation did not have the means to supply materials and labor required to complete electrical and woodworking tasks necessary for a complete installation. Douglas conferred with Dr. Steven Cooksey, organistchoirmaster at St. James Episcopal Church in Leesburg, about finding a proper home for his nearly-completed pipe organ. Lucky for us, Cooksey recommended Holy Trinity Lutheran Church as a worthy recipient. Organ builder Douglas made an unannounced visit during a Sunday worship service and made his decision, based on the size and acoustics of our sanctuary, traditional music worship style and financial ability to complete the project. Some years prior, HTLC Charter Member Irving Gaskill had provided \$10,000 in seed money towards a future pipe organ project, so we were off and running.

Our organist Marcia Merry commandeered a volunteer staff to construct large chambers to house the pipes, wind-

chests and blowers behind our altar. Major electrical work was completed prior to and during installation. Modifications to our chancel woodwork had to be made to accom-

modate the oak console, which boasts two genuine ivory keyboards and a full pedalboard. Earlier, a series of six summer concerts on the church lawn raised many thousands of dollars toward the project. In all, nearly one hundred volunteers worked tirelessly to see the project to completion, and dozens of congregants made financial gifts. Larry Correll, a band director at Simpson Middle School, played the dedicatory recital on December 7, 2008. Correll was Dean of



the Winchester Chapter of the American Guild of Organists at the time.

Today Leesburg native Terry Sisk is our organistchoirmaster. He marvels at the versatility of the organ for hymn singing, choir accompaniment and solo organ performance. He holds sway over the more than 900 pipes and Zimbelstern, a set of small rotating bells mounted high in the corner above the organ console. After many months of employment, Terry pressed an unmarked red button on the console and was astonished to hear the tinkling bells of a Zimbelstern, a feature of German organs dating back to the sixteenth century.

Sisk studied organ at Florida Southern prior to moving to Germany to study with Gunther Jena, a prominent Lutheran church musician and recitalist. During the ensuing years Terry has performed in Australia, South America, Canada and East and West Europe. As well, he has crafted and presented hymn festivals, produced various concert series and worked as a collaborative musician with area soloists and chamber orchestra ensembles. During the late 1990s he was Dean of the American Guild of Organists and today serves on the faculty of the Potomac Organ Institute. Terry has twice conducted the annual Messiah Singalong at the Kennedy Center, and during the past two summers has performed and served on the program committee of Middleburg's Hunt Country Music Festival.

This year marks the fifteenth anniversary of our organ's installation, and the instrument will be featured prominently during our annual Community Carol Sing on Sunday, December 10 at 4:00 p.m. Please invite family and friends to join us for an afternoon of sacred song as we begin the Christmas season. No tickets required.



## From Our President - again...

I'd like to provide you with an update on the financial status of our Property Fund...



Currently, the Air Conditioner Fund stands at \$7,789.49, and we aim to reach \$15,750.00. This leaves us with a remaining amount of \$7,960.51, but we are making progress.

The Roof Fund currently holds \$950.00, and we still require well over \$100,000.

Our primary focus at the moment is the Air Conditioner Fund, as we aim to ensure the pastor and staff have air conditioning by spring.

While we are committed to continuing our contributions to the General Fund to cover our essential expenses, if you have any additional funds to allocate, directing them towards the AC Fund would greatly support our current priority.

I'd like to express my personal gratitude to Matt Shultz and Jerry Harned for their unwavering efforts in maintaining our building's upkeep. Their dedication has resulted in a notable achievement recently. During a visit from the Fire Marshall, our storage rooms off the Commons Area received praise for being the most wellorganized spaces he had ever encountered in his career. This recognition is rare, especially considering my experience working for the Fire Department and with Fire Marshalls, and it serves as a testament to the exceptional work Matt and Jerry consistently deliver. If you come across them, please take a moment to convey your appreciation.




## Classics / Preschool Thanksgiving Celebration

## MEETING HELD IN THE GATHERING AREA

## **DEVOTIONS:**

In Pastor Kristin's absence, Rita Sims offered a prayer.

## **STEWARDSHIP DISCUSSION / COMMITTEE REPORT:**

Ask, Thank, Tell (Stewardship book) Chapters 5 and 6.

- Stewardship Committee members (all members of Council) were present and shared several ideas and recommendations on how to proceed on the stewardship campaign.
- Pastor Kristin provided suggestions via text messages that included new budget ideas and the stewardship campaign.
- Discussion items included:
  - ✓ Would like to add non-Council member(s) to Stewardship Committee to get a different perspective.
  - ✓ Committee is gathering stewardship information using the book as a guide, looking at the ELCA website, Vanco resources, and what other congregations have done.
  - ✓ Working on finding methods to communicate how funds are to be used and making sure that the congregation is aware. People tend to step up when needs are out of the norm and projects come up.
  - $\checkmark$  Recommend trying to build an emergency fund.
  - ✓ Encourage members to think of the budget as a plan instead of a budget, it makes more sense and makes it easier to talk about.
  - ✓ Other suggestions/ideas are found in the full council minutes.

### TREASURER'S REPORT:

- Financial Update
  - Current expenses have been paid; should not change in the next few weeks unless there is a big unplanned expense.
  - Continuing to work on transition and consolidating of accounts to make things simpler.
- All liaisons should contact their assigned committees with their proposed budget needs.

- Finance: Working on preparations for the 2024 budget.

  - $\checkmark$  Light bulbs are being installed.
  - ✓ Plans are in progress to reduce the cost of our phone and Internet bill.

## What does it take to be an Advent Angel?


- \* Look for the Advent Angel sign on the table in the Commons.


